### Fall Luncheon: Lori Matsukawa on “How Technology Is Changing the News Business”

For our fall luncheon, longtime KING 5 news anchor Lori Matsukawa will offer her thoughts on “How Technology Is Changing the News Business.”

We are bombarded with claims that electronic technology is reshaping established institutions: newspapers, universities, political parties — even families. How does the process look from the inside? Matsukawa writes: “The news industry is changing at a rapid pace. Today’s journalists must be able to get their stories out on multiple platforms, including social media and the internet. If you or a young relative wants to enter the fray, what skills are in demand today?”

Lori Matsukawa is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Stanford University (1978), with a master’s from the University of Washington. She’s worked at KING 5 since 1983, reporting on such varied topics as the Winter Olympics, Governor Locke in China, Japanese earthquakes, and Washington apples. She’s been active in multicultural civic and journalistic organizations, and won many awards. Crowned Miss Teenage America in 1974, she says that her favorite story was pulling nine Gs in an F-16.

**UPS Phi Beta Kappa Magee Address:  
Professor Rachel DeMotts on “The Elephants of Our Imagination”**

Tuesday, October 8, 4:30 p.m.  
Trimble Forum, University of Puget Sound, Tacoma  
Free and open to the community

Elephants are the largest terrestrial animal on the planet: graceful, familial, protective, intelligent — and evocative. From halfway around the world, we consider their majesty and are shocked as stories of escalating ivory poaching percolate to the surface and indicate a clear threat. But we encounter elephants with the luxury of distance to protect us; they do not consume our food supply or snap off our water pipes or linger in the dusty road outside our homes and obstruct our paths to school and work. How might we see them differently if they did?

In Botswana, the population of elephants has nearly tripled in the last 30 years, even as poaching is on the rise once again. China’s insatiable demands for ivory fuel a black market that is becoming more and more dangerous for both wildlife and people in rural areas. At the same time, tourists seek out notions of pristine wilderness and chase the perfect photo of an elephant at the river illuminated by the setting sun. The view from the village is far less idyllic, and much harder to see. This talk will be an exploration of view — from both here and away — in an effort to complicate the elephants we imagine and the spaces they occupy.



**Gerald J. Oppenheimer awarded honorary membership**

At our fall luncheon, Gerald J. Oppenheimer will be awarded honorary membership in the Puget Sound Association of Phi Beta Kappa for his sustained and outstanding contributions to the advancement of the purposes for which the association stands.

Oppenheimer was born in Frankfurt am Main, Germany, in 1922, and emigrated to the United States in 1940. He attended the University of Washington, where he earned his B.A. and M.A. (philosophy, 1947). He was initiated into Phi Beta Kappa in 1946. He subsequently attended Harvard University, for graduate studies, and Columbia University, where he received his M.S.L.S. in librarianship.

His first job out of library school was at the Seattle Public Library. Subsequently he became the Fisheries-Oceanography librarian at the UW. In 1960 he took over the library of the Boeing Scientific Research Laboratories.

From 1963 until his retirement in 1987, he was the director of the UW Health Sciences Library. He was the founding president of the Association of Academic Health Sciences Library Directors, and also served on the board and executive committee of the Medical Library Association.

He has been a long-term member of the PSA-PBK board of trustees, serving on the executive committee as the vice president, and most recently as the secretary. He also chairs the undergraduate scholarship committee and is a member of the membership and Stiefel graduate study award committees.

For 15 years, he served as the executive secretary of the Alpha of Washington Phi Beta Kappa chapter at the UW.

Over the years, Oppenheimer has demonstrated an unwavering commitment to the core values of Phi Beta Kappa: knowledge, wisdom, intellectual honesty, broad interests, trust, integrity, and responsibility.

Dr. John Weaver was director of the organ department at the Curtis Institute of Music from 1972 to 2003 and also chair of the organ department at the Julliard School from 1987 to 2004. He served as the director of music at Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York City from 1970 to 2005. He has played throughout North America, western Europe, the United Kingdom, and Brazil, presenting recitals from his large repertoire of memorized programs drawn from every important era and national school of organ literature. Weaver has been hailed as one most important organists of our generation.

His wife, Marianne Weaver, has a master's degree in flute from the Manhattan School of Music, and was first flutist of the Holy Trinity Bach Orchestra in New York City for 25 years. She has also played with numerous other orchestral groups and had a successful teaching career in New York.

Dr. Weaver will give a concert of organ music. Dr. and Mrs. Weaver will also present several works for flute and organ. Come experience one of the world's finest organists! This concert is free and open to the public. A reception will follow.

**Delta Chapter, University of Puget Sound**

In April 2013, 52 members of the University of Puget Sound Class of 2013 and two members of the Class of 2014 were initiated into Phi Beta Kappa at an evening ceremony at the president's house. Initiates and Delta Chapter faculty attended a celebration luncheon with university trustees and President Ronald Thomas during Commencement Weekend in May. Delta Chapter Vice President Alison Tracy Hale, associate professor of English, gave the celebration toast, and seniors Chelsea Clark and Andy Galbraith each shared a reflection about a significant Puget Sound learning experience as a part of the luncheon program. In their comments, Clark emphasized the power of writing as a communicative tool to share her ideas and voice with others and Galbraith described the joy of researching questions he is passionate about and highlighted the importance of faculty support for student research.

**Annual review of financial records**

The PSA-PBK board of trustees has recently adopted a policy requiring an annual review of the organization's financial records. This policy was initiated when we decided that the insurance policy dealing with matters of crime and fiduciary management was too expensive for the limited coverage included. Essentially, the financial records associated with both deposits and disbursements are reviewed by a committee of persons not directly involved in the management of the finances of the organization. At least one member of this review committee must be a non-board member, and the intent is that all persons involved are members of PSA-PBK who volunteer their time to conduct the review.

No later than one month following completion of the fiscal year, the treasurer submits to the review committee a listing of assets deposited in various banks. The balances in these asset accounts are then verified to be the same as those shown on the end-of-year financial report. A sampling of deposits and bills paid are also verified as to amount and timing. Following each review, the review committee files a report with the board indicating the results of its review activity and, when appropriate, suggesting changes in the handling of the financial records.

The board thanks Christopher Frost for serving the past two years as the non-board representative on the review committee and for offering his office as a place to complete the review activities.

Alpha Chapter, University of Washington

For the 2012–13 academic year at the University of Washington, Alpha Chapter invited 374 students to membership in Phi Beta Kappa, and inducted those who accepted the invitation at its annual initiation ceremony on June 12 in Kane Hall. Inductees, with their families looking on, took the traditional oath and signed their names in the ΦBK register. They heard Professor King K. Holmes, chair of the Department of Global Health and a recent recipient of the prestigious Gairdner Award, recount his early career and how he became involved in studying sexually transmitted diseases, from syphilis to HIV/AIDS.

In February, the chapter held its annual Winter Social for ΦBK students and faculty at the UW Club. The featured speaker was Professor Mary-Claire King of the Department of Genome Sciences, herself a Phi Bete serving as one of the UW’s three elected ΦBK senators. (The other two are Professors Zev Handel and Kathleen Woodward.) King spoke about her work in identifying the genetic basis of complex diseases. She is credited with identifying the gene for inherited breast cancer, BRCA1. A movie, Decoding Annie Parker, starring Helen Hunt as King, was shown recently in Seattle theatres.

Also in February, the executive committee of Alpha Chapter hosted a lunch with ΦBK Secretary John Churchill, here to celebrate PSA-PBK’s 60th anniversary. In addition to members of the executive committee, UW Dean of Arts and Sciences Robert Stacey and Professor James Clauss, director of the UW Honors Program, were in attendance. Churchill discussed Phi Beta Kappa’s national initiative in support of the liberal arts and sciences, and the assembled pledged to do all they could to support the initiative. Last spring, the chapter hosted a pizza lunch for ΦBK and UW honors students with UW President Michael Young, who enjoyed meeting and engaging in conversation with all of these high-achieving students. At the UW commencement ceremonies, a Phi Beta Kappa student was honored as the President’s Medalist, the award given to a graduating senior with the most outstanding academic record. Michelle Drews graduated summa cum laude, majoring in biochemistry and neurobiology, with a minor in bioethics and humanities.
