## Spring Luncheon, April 27

### “The Adventurous Life of Thor Heyerdahl: A Personal View by Another Adventurer”

**Wednesday, April 27, 11:45 am**  
**Red Lion Hotel, 1415 Fifth Avenue, Seattle**



Our luncheon speaker this spring is an archaeologist of Egypt, knowledgeable about current political developments there, but personally connected with one of the great explorers of our time. Donald P. Ryan, Ph.D., is best known for his research in Egypt including excavations in the Valley of the Kings where he has discovered lost tombs and controversial mummies. A Faculty Fellow at Pacific Lutheran University, he has written eight books, most recently *Beneath the Sands of Egypt: Adventures of an Unconventional Archaeologist*, which describes many of his adventures. He knows intimately the Egyptian archaeologists, museums, and sites affected by the recent turmoil.

But there’s more:

Donald Ryan was also Thor Heyerdahl’s right-hand man during the last seven years of Heyerdahl’s life. Known to many of us for his bold trans-Pacific voyage on the balsa raft *Kon-Tiki*, Heyerdahl (1914-2002) followed up by other adventures including other experimental voyages (the *Ra* and *Tigris* expeditions on reed boats), and important archaeological investigations on Easter Island and in Peru, the Maldives, the Canary Islands and elsewhere, as excitingly described in many popular books translated into numerous languages. Apart from his scientific endeavors, Heyerdahl was also noted as a peace advocate and global environmentalist.

Ryan worked with Heyerdahl on several projects, including the mysterious pyramids of Guimar in Tenerife; he inherited some of the great explorer’s research and will complete his last book. What is it like to work with a legend? Donald Ryan will tell us.

Ryan is a former professional mountain guide and teaches mountaineering part-time. He continues to climb regularly and is involved in a variety of other adventure sports including mountain-biking, skiing, adventure racing, long-distance running, paragliding, spelunking and Hawaiian outrigger canoe racing. He is known to carry a croquet mallet to mountaintops and other far-flung places for additional recreation. More information is on his website <http://www.plu.edu/~ryandp/>.

## **Tour Burke Museum and Henry Art Gallery**

**Thursday April 7, 5:30 p.m. at the Burke Museum**

Members of PSA-PBK and the Washington Alpha Chapter will have the opportunity to jointly tour the Burke Museum of Natural History and Culture and the Henry Art Gallery. Students and guests are welcome. We will meet at 5:30 p.m. on April 7 inside the main entrance of the Burke Museum, located on the University of Washington campus at the corner of 17th Avenue N.E. (Memorial Way) and N.E. 45th Street. Parking is available adjacent to the building or on the street. There is ample bus service to the UW campus.

Featured exhibits at the Burke Museum include two photography exhibits: The Arctic National Wildlife Refuge and The Owl and the Woodpecker. The Burke will also have an exhibit on the origin and heritage of Ainu culture, in addition to their ongoing exhibits, Life and Times of Washington State and Pacific Voices, where 17 different cultures are represented. The Burke will be open until 8 p.m. The Burke café will also be open until 8, if you wish to purchase food or beverages.

The Pathfinder Award honors those who encourage others to seek new worlds to discover, pathways to explore, and untouched destinations to reach. We are pleased to announce the recipients who will be honored at our Spring Luncheon on April 27.

DAVID BREWSTER, for founding *Seattle Weekly*, Town Hall Seattle, and Crosscut.com, providing writers, musicians, activists, thinkers, politicians, and scientists a forum in Seattle and offering the people of the Seattle area access to extraordinary thinking and expression.

STANLEY CHERNICOFF, of the University of Washington, for his commitment to helping students succeed. He started the Dawg Daze program to assist incoming freshmen make a successful transition to the university. He also founded the Dream Project, in which UW students go to low-income Washington communities and assist qualified high schoolers with the college application process.

TIMOTHY JONES and STARBUCKS COFFEE, for founding and sponsoring the “Hot Java Cool Jazz” concerts, which have supported and showcased young musicians, and have raised over \$200,000 since 1995 to help the music education programs of participating Puget Sound area high schools. The last concert raised \$35,000 for the program.

### ***In Memoriam: Ernest R. Stiefel, 1921-2010***

Ernest R. Stiefel (PBK University of Washington, 1949) joined the board of the Puget Sound Association of Phi Beta Kappa in 1965, and remained a member for over 40 years. During that time, he served as treasurer and assistant treasurer. He had a strong commitment to our mission of supporting liberal-arts education at the University of Washington and the University of Puget Sound. Our Ernest R. Stiefel Graduate Study Awards were named in his honor. We were saddened to hear of his death. The following obituary was provided by his family.

Ernest R. Stiefel passed away peacefully on October 18, 2010, surrounded by his family. He was born on June 17, 1921 in Frankfurt am Main, Germany. He considered it a miracle that he was able to escape Germany in July 1940 by way of Russia, Manchuria, Korea, and Japan, arriving in Seattle on August 3, 1940 with the first group to take the eastern route. Penniless, he was greeted and assisted by the Seattle Jewish community, a debt he spent his life repaying through community service. [Note from PSA-PBK: In 2000, Ernie wrote “A Memorable Journey” for the Washington State Jewish Historical Society, detailing his trip of many thousands of miles.]

He served in the United States Army Air Corps from 1943 to 1946, returning to Europe during the war as an intelligence officer. He returned to Seattle and graduated in 1949 from the University of Washington with a degree in business administration and as a member of Phi Beta Kappa. He passed the CPA examination in May 1949 with the highest score in the state and then practiced public accounting until his retirement in 1986. A highly intelligent and passionate accountant and business advisor, he had a strong and loyal client following.

He devoted himself as a leader in the Jewish and greater Seattle community. He was a founder of Congregation Beth Shalom and Congregation Ner Tamid. He served as president of Congregation Beth Shalom, the Jewish Federation of Greater Seattle, Hillel at the University of Washington, and the Jewish Education Council; as treasurer of the Puget Sound Association of Phi Beta Kappa; and on the boards of numerous other organizations, including United Way of King County, the Washington State Jewish Historical Society, and Music of Remembrance. He was the financial conscience of many organizations. Passionate about Jewish education and Jewish continuity, he was gifted with an exceptional memory for detail, and enjoyed researching family genealogy and German Jewish history. He was devoted to his loving family. Ernie is survived by his loving wife of nearly 60 years, Doris J. Stiefel, and his children, David (Joy), Mark (Sheryl), Sharon (Davida Alperin), and his grandchildren, Elana, Jason, Miriam, Nathan, Michael, and Emi. He was a role model to all of them and his presence will be sorely missed.

### **Ernest R. Stiefel Graduate Study Award \$3,700 this year**

The Ernest R. Stiefel Graduate Study Award is given to graduate or professional students who are members of Phi Beta Kappa chapters at UPS, UW, WSU, Whitman College, University of Hawaii, University of Idaho, University of Oregon, Lewis and Clark College, Reed College or Willamette University; and who will begin their graduate studies at either the UPS or UW in the academic year 2011–12. This year, one award of \$3,700 will be made. The deadline is June 20. ### ***Organ music and architecture: Our January tour***

Our January tour of Beneroya Hall started with a short concert on the beautiful Watjen Organ. Eighteen Phi Betes and friends were escorted by a chatty and knowledgeable docent who told of early problems in building the hall and obtaining and installing the organ.

It is a true community organ with scheduled free public performances. We enjoyed opera transcriptions which cover a wide range of sounds, demonstrating the smallest to the largest of the 4,490 pipes. You can still enjoy a free concert of Viennese classics on July 6 or a celebration of Franz Liszt's 200th birthday on August 1.

LMN Architects faced some unusual problems in building on the site. We appreciate most the absence of intrusive sound, even though buses and light rail run beneath it and near it. Beneroya Hall is actually an insulated concrete box within a box, supported by rubber pads. Even though it houses two concert halls, the 2,500 seat S. Mark Taber Foundation Auditorium and the 540 seat Illsley Ball Nordstrom Recital Hall, no sound leaks from one to the other, making it possible to have two concerts at the same time. Sight lines, too, were given meticulous attention, as well as acoustics, making both halls patron friendly.

One delightful fact provided by our docent: the beautiful wood panelling within the main auditorium came from one tree in northwest Africa.

Benaroya Hall is a jewel in downtown Seattle, not just for concertgoers, but for all citizens. From the Remembrance Garden on the west side, to the spectacular night views from the lobby, to the beauty of the concert halls themselves, some would say it was a bargain at the \$114.1 million cost.
